Gold/Silver Medal Game:
Adanacs punish Posse

Uncovering gold at the B.C. Junior B Lacrosse Championships in Vernon was high on the Coquitlam Adanacs' summer holiday list compiled way back in April.

The Prince George Posse, meanwhile, felt fortunate just getting a full roster of players together for the five-team

tournament at the Multiplex.

The Adanacs flashed a powerplay smoother than a lime margarita, kept the Posse shooters to the perimeter and received clutch goaltending from Arlen Chudley in a 14-3 stuffing of Prince George in the gold-medal final Sunday afternoon before 300 fans.

Coquitlam, who sleepwalked to the West Coast League title at 16-1-1 (only loss of the year was to the Delta Islanders), opened the provincials with a 15-6 win over Prince George and topped the preliminary round at 3-0-1. "Our goal was to win provincials this year," said Adanac head coach Greg Holland, an assistant the last three years. "We knew we had the talent to win. I didn't expect us to beat Prince George like we did today, but we were confident we were going to win."

Holland said only Chudley and Justin Tellis were part of Coquitlam's provincial championship team two years ago. "We had 18 rookies," said Holland, seconds after receiving a champagne shower from his players. "Our team chemistry is great. It's a closeknit bunch of guys who are close friends on and off the floor."

The Adanacs outshot the Posse 63-28 and chased starting goalie Russ Mills when lefty Shaun O'Leary scored shorthanded to make it 8-2 with seven minutes left in the second period.

O'Leary, who had the hat-trick, and Chris Cowieson, who finished with two goals, gave Coquitlam a 2-0 first-period lead. Cowieson, also a southpaw, ended a gorgeous sequence of quick passes by burying a shot from the left side of the crease on a powerplay.

The roadrunning Adanacs added five goals in seven minutes to go in front 13-2 midway through the final period. Big Bubba Westwood stopped the goal-a-thon by outmuscling two Adanac defenders in front of the net and scoring shorthanded on a fabulous solo effort.

"We thought it would be a little tighter," said Coquitlam captain Nick Augustine, 21, one of four graduating Adanacs. "We're solid on every line and it showed today. Arlen played outstanding all tournament and throughout the playoffs. We talked before the game and said, 'Nothing gets by us today.' We decided this was going to be our game." Jaret Bradley with two goals, Eli Woodscowcroft, Augustine, Dane Reelie, Paul Jarvie, Matt Brasica, Tellis and Patrick Lowe completed the Coquitlam offence.

Jesse Huffman scored a pair of second-period goals for the defending champion Posse, who struggled to a sixth-place showing at 6-11-1 in the Rocky Mountain loop this season.

"It's kind of sad," said Prince George captain Chris Madsen. "We worked so hard all year and to fall short like this was embarrassing. But at the start of the year it didn't look like we'd have a team. We had to pull guys out of the closet. Every game I think we only had 15 runners. This was the first time we had a full team."

Prince George went 3-1 in the round-robin, grounding the Kamloops Rattlers 12-7, icing the Peninsula Falcons of Sidney 15-10 and thumping the Vernon Tigers 8-2. Coquitlam tied the Falcons 7-7, outlasted Vernon 11-9 and shut out Kamloops 8-0 in their other preliminary games.

"Coquitlam's a good team, they're fast and they've got a good offence, probably the best offence in the tournament," said Madsen. "One of our problems was discipline (they took 50 of 65 penalty minutes in the final) and we knew that coming here."

Augustine said the Adanacs basically check their egos at the door and have a blast playing boxla.

"Everyone's friends and we're all here to have fun," he said. "Some guys eat, breathe and live lacrosse, but not us. Everyone's a part of this team. Different guys have to sit out each game and nobody complains."

On the Posse, he added: "Prince George is a good team with some big guys. I'm sure it could have gone either way had we not stepped it up."

Bronze Medal Game:
Rattlers upend Falcons

Denied at the tournament banquet buffet table Sunday night, the Kamloops Rattlers pampered their palate Monday morning by pocketing a bronze medal at the B.C. Junior B Lacrosse Championships.

Alex Turner, a 50-goalman during the regular Thompson-Okanagan League season, scored four times as the Rattlers stopped the Peninsula Falcons of Sidney 6-5. Turner's fourth goal at 8:46 of the third period stood as the winner.

A sad sack Sunday which saw the Rattlers lose 13-10 to the Falcons and 8-0 to the eventual champion Coquitlam Adanacs got even worse at the banquet when there wasn't enough food to go around. Red-faced tourney officials ordered pizzas to feed the Rattlers.

Kamloops snuck into the bronze-medal game at 1-3. The Rattlers shaded the winless Vernon Tigers 7-6 in their

opener Saturday and then fell 12-7 to the defending champion Prince George Posse.

Coquitlam punished Prince George 14-3 in the final.

"We just came out hard today," said the Rattlers' Sheldon Araki, a co-captain with Joss Sveinson. "Those few losses kind of put us in our place and we came out today and played strong defence and put the ball on net. Our usual scorers got the big goals."

Nathan Woldum and Greg Schulte completed the Kamloops offence in the medal tilt. Shawn Donahue added three assists, while Araki and goalie Scott Helton each had two helpers. Helton made 48 saves.

Peninsula (14-0 on the regular season) grabbed period leads of 4-2 and 5-4 on a hat-trick from Ryan Werk and singles from Michael Morris and Trevor Walton. The Falcons were 2-1-1 in preliminary play.

The Rattlers, who recorded the lowest penalty minutes in the five-team championships at 68, got three goals from Turner, including the winner with 41 seconds remaining, to stop Vernon.

Sveinson (2), Mark Jurista and Kyle LeBlond helped out offensively. Kin Kelsey had four assists.

In their loss to Prince George, the Rattlers received goals from Jordan Foster, Sveinson, Turner, Greg and Gary Schulte, LeBlond and Craig Mattioli.

Sveinson, Jurista and Jared Emery each scored twice in the round-robin loss to the Falcons. Werk had six goals for Peninsula. Arlen Chudley turned back 30 shots and team officials photocopied the scoresheet to get framed as Coquitlam earned a rare shutout win over Kamloops.

"It took us a while to get going," said Araki. "The competition here was very tough and we've played a ton of lacrosse in the last month. Our regular season ended July 4 and our first playoff series went three games and the final series went five games so we're kind of beat up and looking forward to a bit of a rest."

The Rattlers, who only lose two players to graduation, had one of the youngest teams in the tournament.

Kirkland ends run behind bench

Three years and three straight appearances in the provincials. Toss in an excellent regular-season coaching record and it has been a good run for Bill Kirkland.

The classy bench boss of the Vernon Source For Sports Tigers will step aside and play Masters lacrosse next season. The Cats lose nine players to graduation.

"The kids need a change, they can only listen to me for so long," said Kirkland, a key member of the national senior B championship Vernon Tiger teams of the 1970s. "It's been a real privilege to have coached this crew. They are a great bunch of kids, they were special."

The Tigers suffered some tough breaks in the weekend B.C. Junior B Lacrosse Championships at the Multiplex. They went 0-4 but an 8-2 loss to the Prince George Posse was the only blowout.

"The kids competed hard, we were pleased with the effort," said Kirkland. "Glen Clissold had a great tournament (in goal). They gave us everything was asked for."

The Tigers opened with a 7-6 loss to the Kamloops Rattlers Saturday afternoon and then lost a soul-hurting 11-10 thriller to the Peninsula Falcons of Sidney Saturday night.

The game was tied 10-10 and Kirkland decided to play for the win and pulled Clissold for an extra attacker with 23 seconds remaining.

"We got the look we wanted and Kyle Point scored but the referees on the floor didn't see it go in the net," said Kirkland. "The spectators behind the net were going crazy and our guys were celebrating. Tanner Skolrood scored a few seconds later and the same thing happened. Then they came down and scored in an empty net. It was hugely frustrating, they played so hard."

Trevor Walton, who finished with 4+2, scored the empty-net winner with 12 seconds to go. Point, Andrew Hamilton and Brodie Venn each scored twice for Vernon, singles going to Scott Stevens, Mitch Schochter, Skolrood and Andy Holte.

The Tigers lost their opener 7-6 to the Kamloops Rattlers, Alex Turner's hat-trick goal with 41 seconds the winner. Skolrood (2), Stevens, Rob Rintoul, Rob Gray and Jeff Stairs had the Vernon goals.

Stairs and Holte each netted two goals against Coquitlam Sunday morning. Ryan Minchenko, Kyle Bronson, Gray, Venn and Hamilton completed the Tiger offence.

"They worked like dogs, Vernon had us going," said Adanac captain Nick Augustine, who joined teammate Chris Cowieson in scoring twice.

Hamilton and Stevens had the Tiger goals in the Sunday night loss to the Posse, who led 5-0 after one period. Bronson said the Tigers highly respected Kirkland.

"He was a great coach," said Bronson. "He knows the game so well and he's got so much experience to draw from. He's just a great guy who's very personable with the players. It was a great experience to have him at the helm."

Playing on the Vancouver Ravens' pro carpet at the Multiplex doesn't change the mindset of the Vernon Source For Sports Tigers.

The Cats, who lost to the Prince George Posse in last year's B.C. Junior B Lacrosse Championship final, plan to keep things simple as they open the five-team tourney Saturday (12:15 p.m.) against the Thompson-Okanagan kingpin Kamloops Rattlers.

"We're going to play our up-tempo game with good defence and good goaltending," said Tiger head coach Bill Kirkland. "Goaltending will be the key because there will be some big snipers."

Glenn Clissold gets the start in net for Vernon, who will carry a 22-man roster.

"If we can play for a medal Monday, that would be a good tournament for us," said Kirkland, who won't have Andrew Hamilton, Brandon Ditchfield and Matt Holte for the opener.

Hamilton and Ditchfield received one-game suspensions and Holte a three-gamer for their part in a line brawl with 14 seconds left in their final playoff tilt against the Kamloops Rattlers.

"We expect Tanner Skolrood to step up and be a force (with Holte sidelined). He needs to get us some offence," said Kirkland.

The West Coast champion Coquitlam Adanacs meets the Posse in game one at 10 a.m., while the Island champion Pensinsula Falcons battle Coquitlam at 2:30 p.m. The Tigers face the Falcons Saturday at 7 p.m.

Peninsula averaged 16 goals a game and gave up an average of 2.92 goals a game in sweeping the Pacific Northwest Junior Lacrosse League.

In Sunday games, Vernon tangles with the Adanacs at 10:15 a.m. and meet Prince George at 4:45 p.m. The gold-medal game goes Monday at 1 p.m. preceded by the bronze-medal game at 10 a.m.

"We could play outstanding and go 0-4," said Kirkland Tuesday night. "Coquitlam will be very good, Peninsula was 14-0 and Prince George will be strong. Kamloops and

Rutland both played us tough."

The Rattlers rode the red-hot goaltending of Scott Helton to a 12-6 win over Rutland in the fifth and deciding game of the Thompson-Okanagan playoff final Tuesday night before 500 fans at Prospera Place.

The Rattlers finished the regular season in third spot at 13-5 behind the Cats (14-3-1) and pennant-winning Raiders (16-2-1). Kamloops will welcome back enforcer Mike Tremblay, who received a five-game suspension for starting the line brawl against Vernon by jumping Tiger captain Rob Rintoul from behind.

Fourth-year Tiger Andrew Hamilton, an alternate captain to Rob Rintoul, compares this team to last year.

"They are very similar," said Hamilton, 21. "We have the same core group. Team defence will be the key. Our offence will come from that. We really need to key our defence to stop the strong Coastal teams. Heart and dedication to our team system will give us success."

Jeff Stairs, a 19-year-old in his third year with the Tigers, plans to play a physical style to jumpstart Vernon.

"I just like to work hard and try to be a leader and score when I can," said Stairs. "Hopefully, we'll get back to the final and get the win this time."

Ryan Minchenko, an 18-year-old in his second season with Vernon, enjoys boxla big-time. He skated with the Revelstoke Grizzlies of the KIJHL last winter.

"Lacrosse is a lot more tiring (than hockey) so you have to be way more fit," he said before a running drill at practice Tuesday night. "It's a great cross-trainer for hockey. Every practice is hard and every game is intense."

The tournament banquet goes Sunday night in the banquet room at the Multiplex. Raffle and jersey tickets will be drawn at 7 p.m.

Tournament passes for all 12 games go for \$20 (adults) and \$18 (students). Day passes for five games either Saturday or Sunday are \$10.

Admission for the medal games is \$5 per game.

July 15: Rattlers Eliminate Tigers

The Vernon Tigers are focusing on a new goal after being eliminated from the Thompson-Okanagan League playoffs Thursday night at the Civic. A hungry Kamloops Rattlers defeated the Tigers 11-8 to win the semi-final series two games to one. The Rattlers move on to face the Rutland Raiders for the league championships while the Tigers get an extra week to prepare for the Provincial Championships on the August long weekend.

Tigers head coach Bill Kirkland was disappointed with the loss but gave full credit to the Rattlers. "They took advantage of our defensive miscues and hustled for the whole game," he said. "They out-played us and got superb goaltending from Scott Helton. It was a good series between two well-matched teams."

The Rattlers jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the first period on two goals by Nathan Woldum (3+2) and one from Kin Kelsey (1+1). However, Mitch Schocter (3+0) scored his first of three on the night, Kyle Point (1+0) picked the corner and Karl Friesen (1+0) converted a pass on the run from Andrew Hamilton (0+1) to tie the game 3-3 by the end of the period. Shots on goal were even at 23 for the period.

The second period also started out badly for the Tigers. Kamloops ran up a 6-3 lead, which Vernon never succeeded in overcoming, although they challenged several times. Andy Holte (1+3), Matt Holte (2+0) and Schocter scored for Vernon. Kamloops captain Joss Sveinson (3+1) scored a trio, with Sheldon Araki (2+0) and Woldum contributing one apiece to make the score 8-6 at the end of the second period. Vernon had a slight 19-18 edge in shots but could not seem to get the ball past Helton, hitting five posts in the period.

The third period was a more even affair although Tiger netminder Glen Clissold faced 25 shots, compared to 20 fired at Helton. Goals by Matt Holte and Schocter kept Vernon in the game but they could not quite catch up. Araki, Alex Turner (1+3) and Greg Schulte (1+0).

Kamloops will play the league finals without the services of their agitator and goon Mike Tremblay. With fourteen seconds in the game, Tremblay jumped Tiger Captain Rob Rintoul from behind. When the dust settled, Tremblay received a game misconduct, a three-game match penalty and a gross misconduct for precipitating a mini-brawl. Rattlers Gary Schulte and Woldum also got the gate, as did the Tigers' Holte, Hamilton and Brandon Ditchfield.

Rob Gray and Ditchfield contributed one assist each in the losing cause. Final shots on goal were 66 for Kamloops and 62 for Vernon. Penalty minutes were even at 65 apiece.

Head coach Bill Kirkland plans on keeping his team busy practicing hard for the Provincial championships, which Vernon hosts over the August long weekend at the Multiplex. "While it will be nice to exact revenge on either the Rattlers or the Raiders at the Provincials, we have our eyes on a bigger goal," he says. "Last year we won the silver medal but this year we have our sights set on the gold." Kirkland views the semi-final loss as a temporary setback and expects his team to play their best at the Provincials.

The Vernon Source for Sports Tigers answered the bell in Kamloops Tuesday night. Facing elimination from the league playoffs after losing game one Saturday night, the Tigers scored a decisive 6-3 victory over the Rattlers. Tiger coach Bill Kirkland was proud of his team's gutsy effort, citing outstanding goaltending by Glen Clissold and improved defensive play. The Tigers will now face the Rattlers in the third and deciding game at the Civic Arena Thursday night.

The Tigers got off to a strong start, running up a 3-0 lead by the end of the first period. Brandon Ditchfield (1+0), Brodie Venn (1+1) and Andy Holte (1+1) scored the only goals of the frame. Vernon checked their opponents very closely and outshot them 18-15.

The Rattlers got back in the game in the second period on goals by Alex Turner (1+0) and Nathan Woldum (1+0). However, Kyle Bronson (1+2) stepped up and blasted the game winner over Rattler goalie Scott Helton's shoulder. The Rattlers outshot Vernon 22-13 in the second period but didn't get a lot of quality opportunities. When they had a scoring opportunity, Clissold was there to make the save.

As was the case in Vernon last weekend, it was an extremely physical, close checking game, with the referees seemingly willing to turn a blind eye to most infractions. At the beginning of the second period, Rattler captain Joss Sveinson charged Clissold. He then paid dearly for his pains after Tiger captain Rob Rintoul administered a beating that Sveinson will not soon forget. Unfortunately, Rintoul was ejected from the game but will return Thursday.

Vernon played a solid defensive game in the third period and Clissold turned his play up yet another notch, turning aside all but one of the 22 shots he faced. Karl Friesen (1+0) scored what turned out to be the insurance marker and Andrew Hamilton (1+0) gave his team added breathing room by capitalizing on an unassisted drive to the net later in the period. Gary Shulte's (1+0) goal for Kamloops was not enough to get Kamloops back in the game.

Kamloops outshot Vernon 59-45 but Vernon had more quality scoring chances and every goal in the game was a hard-won marker. Vernon had a slight edge in penalties, taking 24 minutes to Kamloops' 1½ 20 minutes. Rintoul (0+1), Mitch Schocter (0+1), and Kyle Point (0+1) all contributed assists.

Head coach Bill Kirkland thought his team played very well and looks forward to an equally hotly contested game three. "Kamloops never lets up," he said. "Fans can expect more hard-hitting, close-checking, good old-style lacrosse on Thursday night. Every game in the series has been an intense contest that could go either way." Kirkland is looking forward to the return of Rintoul and hopes that veterans Matt Holte and Jeff Stairs will also be back Thursday. Both missed Tuesday night's game.

Game three starts at 7:30 Thursday night at the Civic.

Saturday night at the Civic Arena, the Vernon Tigers ran into a major roadblock on their path to the Thompson-Okanagan Junior B Lacrosse finals. A fired-up Kamloops Rattlers defeated the Tigers 11-8 in a hard-fought Game One of the semi-finals.

The Tigers got off to a good start, thanks to a quick goal from Rob Gray (2+1). However, the Rattlers fought right back with a goal from Scott Donahue (1+0). The two teams traded goals to end a period of tight defence and gritty, physical play in a 2-2 tie. Matt Holte (1+0) scored the other Tiger goal while Nathan Woldum (2+1) scored for the visitors. The Tigers outshot the Rattlers 17-6 but had a hard time getting clear shots on Rattler net minder Scott Helton.

The second period also ended in a tie, with each team scoring three times. The Tigers appeared to be getting the game under control by running up a two-goal lead. However, the Rattlers did not give up and exploited some defensive lapses to end the period in a 5-5 tie. Andy Holte (1+3), Jeff Stairs (1+1) and Kyle Bronson (2+0) all scored beautiful goals for the Tigers. Woldum, Mark Jurista (3+0) and Craig Mattioli (1+0) replied for the Rattlers, who outshot the Tigers 25-19.
